President's report

Notes on 19 March 2014 monthly meeting

Our 19 March monthly meeting was attended by 26 people, including one new member.

I summarized the nature of the deliberations at our last Executive Committee meeting:

- A new gazebo has been purchased to make things easier when we attend community events. A little larger than the current one, it also has side and back panels to provide some protection against the weather.
- Calvary Hospital has accepted our offer to donate a urine flowmeter unit and we are waiting for them to tell us what the next step is.
- We have been asked to fund a prostate cancer nursing course for one of the nurses in the ACT Health Community Care program as we have done in the past. We agreed in principle to do this in the second half of the year. The cost will be about \$3,500.
- A new supply of pamphlets has been purchased following a runout at our last community event.
- We have contacted two specialists to ask if they would like to present to us in the future. These were Dr H El Saleh, a radiation oncologist and Dr H F ("Rex") Chan, a urological surgeon. Dr Ahmad Al-Sameraaii and Dr Hodo haxhimolla will also be giving presentations to the group in the near future.

Instead of having a guest speaker, the time available was devoted to general discussion between members on their problems, experiences and expectations.

- One member was diagnosed with prostate cancer some time back and 7 months ago underwent an open prostatectomy. He spent 9 days in hospital due to the complications. Because he is experiencing a rising PSA, the possibility of radiation is not excluded.
- There was significant discussion of the benefits and possible consequences of various radiotherapy alternatives. Several members commented on the lack of symptoms or, in some cases, internal burning causing rectal and

anal problems. The consensus was that we have an imperfect understanding of exactly how cancer was targeted by radiotherapy. Members agreed that it would be worthwhile having a guest speaker who was a radiation oncologist and a specialist in the treatment of advanced prostate cancer with hormone therapy and new drugs such as Xofigo (Radium 223, previously known as Alpharadin) (*about which, see article later in this newsletter - Ed*.).

- Another member provided further background on his radiation treatment at THC subsequent to a radical prostatectomy and recounted his experience with post-operative infection contracted in hospital. This needed treatment with intravenous antibiotics and seemed to be successfully cured. However some time later he came down with a further infection caused by the Clostridium Difficile ("C Diff") organism. This was especially hard to treat and is reported to have a fair chance of causing death. This infection has now been cured.
- The value or otherwise of supplements such as Saw Palmetto was discussed with the general consensus that it appeared to be of little value.
- The general issue of relaxation was also discussed and it was agreed that it could be the subject of a presentation (*this will occur at the next meeting - ed.*).

Two administrative matters were raised by me:

- Whenever you come to a meeting, please add your name to the attendance book. This is important for insurance coverage.
- If you stay to have supper, men please pitch in \$2 to cover the cost of tea, coffee and cake.

The next monthly meeting will be at usual place and time on Wednesday 16 April 2014.

We would be seeking participation from 4 or 5 volunteers who have a relatively recent diagnosis, or have continuing health issues relating to a cancer diagnosis and its treatment.
