President's report

Recent noteworthy events:

- Executive Committee Meetings: held on 3 June and 3 July 2014. We have these meetings every month to sort out administrative issues that would otherwise clog up our monthly meetings. Members are welcome to attend these meetings that are held 1.30pm on the first Thursday of each month at SHOUT. Things covered at the to most recent meetings:
 - ★ We agreed a speaker program for July through November.
 - ★ Daryl O'Brien has agreed to deal with Defence and Vets affairs issues that arise periodically.
 - Mike Boesen will print new name tags which will be retained by each member and brought to each meeting and to public event as required. This will reduce the workload at each monthly meeting.
 - New members to receive a printed badge as part of a 'Welcome Pack'.
 - ★ We were given a demonstration of the PA system available in our meeting room and will make use of it in future. There is also a Hearing Loop facility that may be helpful for hearing impaired members.
 - ★ We discussed the need for a system for maintaining membership records.
 - In the light of the fact that none of our members volunteered to take on some of the clerical activities that need to be undertaken, we will approach Volunteers ACT to see if someone outside our membership able to assist. In particular we need clerical assistance to develop a presentation program.
 - * Support for course costs to be given to Glenn Pidgeon RN. Glenn is a locally-based registered nurse. He is going to undertake the Prostate Nursing Care postgraduate diploma level course provided by La Trobe University in the second semester of 2014. will add to the stock of qualified staff to support men under treatment for prostate cancer. Glenn is currently working as a community nurse in Tuggeranong and is keen to work in this field, he has considerable experience in general nursing and disability support, having run his own medical equipment business in the past.

- **Presentation to Tuggeranong Men's Shed** on 10 June 2014. I attended this on short notice and gave our standard presentation on prostate cancer, which was well received.
- Department of Defence Show n Shine at Brindabella Park on 19 June. This is the second in a series of motorbike events, which will culminate in the Long Ride (Canberra to Uluru) in September. It was a fundraiser for the PCFA. I attended this event with George Kayaba, Steve Sweet, John Lucas and Jaroslav Kaszparszak. We provided information to a number of people attending and expressed our gratitude for the funds provided to the PCFA.
- Donations received from the organisers of the 2013 German Autofest and from the VW Car Club. We have gratefully received donations of \$1,200 and \$600 given to our Group by these two organisations. Many thanks to the automobile fraternity!

Secretary's report in the meeting on 18 June 2014

Attendance - including three new members - was 28. Once again, the number of signatures in the book did not match the head count. Signing the attendance book is important for the reporting of the group and it would be appreciated if names could be printed in a clear form way that will save us the need to guess at the details provided.for ease of interpretation. Please! **Guest speaker**. The guest speaker was well-known ACT urologist Dr. Hodo Haxhimolla who had only recently returned from an overseas study tour. He informed us about a number of matters including:

• Fusion imaging used in undertaking prostate biopsies. Traditionally, prostate biopsies have relied on ultrasound to map the location of the prostate. However ultrasound images are not very precise and lack precision in assisting in the placement of biopsy needles. Fusion Imaging, amalgamate information from MRI and ultrasound images and improves the targeting of prostate biopsies. Dr Haxhimolla expressed strong endorsement for the use of MRI technology in the context of diagnosis and treatment of prostate cancer. (Note the content of two articles relating to MRI fusion imaging, referred to later in this newsletter. Ed.)

- Dr Haxhimolla commented on a recent press article by Dr Frank Bowden that recommended against PSA testing on the basis that it may lead to unnecessary biopsies and the potential of causing serious blood infections in 2% of cases. Dr Haxhimolla indicated that the actual infection rate is closer to 1%. He referred to an alternative biopsy technique - the transperineal biopsy - which does not involve penetration of the bowel. He indicated that this technique has an infection rate of about 0.5%, but takes more than double the time, and where infection occurs it is likely to be staph infection, which can cause abscesses. - An improved blood test named the PHI (Prostate Health Index) that is based on PSA characteristics. (*The June 2014 edition of The Walnut summarises an article by Stacey Loeb and William Catalona*

 Dr Haxhimolla touched on the issue of erosion of the urethra, which can sometimes occur after installation of a urethral sling or artificial sphincter. He described a new device that allowed allows the pressure exerted on the urethra to be varied, so that risk of erosion can be reduced.

New members.

The three new members provided information about their status and plans for future treatment. One had a prostatectomy some 4 years ago and his PSA is still negligible. Another new member reported having a biopsy indicating a relatively low Gleason score of 6. He is awaiting placement for the operation in Sydney. The third new member was diagnosed as having an aggressive cancer and is now undergoing radiation therapy.

General matters.

- The **need for clerical assistance** with some administrative work was discussed. This could be undertaken by a member of the group or, less preferably, by paying someone to assist on a parttime basis. Members were encouraged to read the duty statement, which had been circulated via email, and consider helping. (*Unfortunately, noone has indicated their availability. Ed.*)
- The existence of **new name tags** was noted. Members are asked to find their name tag, insert it in any of the plastic holders, take it home, bring it to any meeting attended, and wear it at any event attended.
- The president noted that he would not be at the September meeting, which will comprise both the **Annual General Meeting and a Special General Meeting** to consider a change to the constitution to limit office-holders length of service. The immediate past president, Peter Daley has agreed to chair this meeting.

Fusion-guided biopsies

A 3 March 2014 Urology Times article by John Jesitus entitled *"MRI guiding future of prostate cancer diagnosis"* provides informative details about about the MRI-fusion imaging technique, and the views of a number of experts in this field. In a 4 June Medscape Urology article by Fran Lowry, a clinical trial of MRI-fusion biopsy undertaken by Dr Ardeshi Rastinehad *et al* is reported and reference is also made to a study undertaken by Morgan Pokorny *et al*. The Lowry article is <u>here</u> and here: <u>http://tinyurl.com/nnmmxox</u>

In an abstract of his study, Rastinehad states that: "Magnetic resonance imaging/transrectal ultrasound fusion guided biopsy can improve prostate cancer detection. The results of this trial support the external validity of this platform and may be the next step in the evolution of prostate cancer management." Pokorny is quoted by Lowry as saying "I think the future lies with MRI. We're not categorically saying you shouldn't do TRUS-guided biopsies, but we think that MRI can help you risk-stratify very powerfully - more so than any other tool."
